

# The Chicken and the Road

3. If taken seriously, it could be seen as an example of folk psychology, where **humans instinctively attribute beliefs, desires, and intentions** to animals and other entities.

In discussions on intentionality, the joke serves as a simple yet illustrative example of how we habitually describe actions in terms of goals and purposes, even when none may actually exist.
